Present Pastor of Holy Family Church (1912—).

Historical Notes

HE primary meeting for the organization of Holy Family Parish was held May 20, 1883, in the parlor of Old Mt. St. Mary Seminary, on Warsaw and Hawthorne avenues. About twenty men were present at this meeting, of which Mr. Anthony Spellmire was chosen Chairman, and Mr. S. W. Hollen, Sr., Secretary. Among those present, as recorded in the minute books, were Messrs. Anthony Spellmire, S. W. Hollen, Sr., Geo. Spellmire, Wm. O'Brien, Wm. White, John Ruppert, Edw. A. Foy, Geo. Gerke, Hugh Shiels, David Babbitt, John Keeshan, F. Hengehold, F. Linck, Anthony Schnier, R. M. Kuerze, H. Von Benken, P. Tracy, P. J. Hogan and G. W. Murray.


The original Committee on Organization consisted of Messrs. Wm. O'Brien, S. W. Hollen, Sr., John Ruppert, Anthony Spellmire and Edw. A. Foy.

The first pastor, Rev. John H. Menke, was appointed in January, 1884.

The first congregational services were held in the Seminary Chapel on Sunday, January 13, 1884.

The following gentlemen constituted the first Board of Church Wardens, elected at a congregational meeting Sunday, January 20, 1884: S. W. Hollen, Sr., Secretary; Geo. Gerke, Treasurer; Anthony Spellmire, Geo. Spellmire, Wm. O'Brien, Wm. White, Hugh Shiels, John Keeshan, F. Linck, and R. M. Kuerze. At this same meeting the name for the new church was chosen by ballot. The following names were presented: "St. Alphonsus," by Father Menke; "St. Leo," by Hugh Shiels; "St. Cecilia," by Frank Linck; "Holy Family," by S. W. Hollen, Sr. The first ballot resulted as follows: "St. Alphonsus," 1; "St. Leo," 4; "Holy Family," 10; "St. Cecilia," 11. One blank vote was cast, making a total of 27 votes cast. None of the names having received a majority of the votes cast, a second ballot was taken which resulted as follows: "Holy Family," 15; St. Cecilia," 12. On motion the adoption of the name of "Holy Family" was made unanimous.

Such was the humble beginning of what is now one of the foremost parishes in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. The original church building, now familiarly referred to as the "old church," was dedicated on Sunday, August 24, 1884. The "old church" still stands within the shadow of the "new" as a monument of sacrifice and devotion to the pioneer parishioners, some of whom have survived its thirty-three years' existence, leaving its hallowed walls with many a fond memory to participate in the dedication of the beautiful new edifice. The first pastor, Rev. John H. Menke, labored earnestly and faithfully in the face of obstacles which are quite common in the erection of every new parish, and his task was rendered a doubly difficult one by the ravages of disease which began to undermine his health and eventually brought about the resignation of his pastorate. Because of many adverse conditions the seeds of organization which he had so carefully planted failed to bear fruit to the extent that his heart had desired. The history of his pastorate is not unlike that of innumerable other first pastors—it fills a martyr's page.

Historical Notes-Continued

The work of reconstruction fell beneath the watchful eye and careful hand of Father Drufner, and those who knew this giant soul with its self-sacrificing spirit, are well aware of his nobility of character and wonderful ability. Large in physique and big of heart, he masterfully took up the burden and placed Holy Family Parish upon a desirable and enviable basis. Systematic progress marked his pastorate. He improved the old church structure, placed the parish in possession of the present pastoral residence, purchased old Library Hall, in which the first impetus was given to the presidential activities of Hon. Wm. H. Taft, and converted it into the present Holy Family School. The plans for the new church were drawn under his regime, and he originated the Holy Family Church Building Association, which was productive of great fruits as a fund for the erection of the new church building.

Years of untiring efforts and indefatigable zeal, filled with much anxiety, though blessed with encouraging results, eventuated, the breaking down of this adamant constitution five years before his demise. After a decade and a half of years of devotion to Holy Fam-

ily Parish Father Drufner was called by the Eternal Judge to give an account of his stewardship July 21, 1912.

Rev. A. F. Runnebaum then took hold of the pilot wheel and continued the course so ably begun by his predecessors, bringing the Good Old Ship safely into port. Today the people of Holy Family Parish dedicate to God and Religion a completely equipped new church, beautiful in structure and in the words of our Most Rev. Archbishop, a "Little Jewel," yet sufficiently commodious for all needs and purposes of Holy Family Parish until the end of time.

The structure is of the Romanesque Renaissance style of architecture, has a seating capacity of 760 and was erected and equip-

ped at an approximate cost of \$175,000.00, carrying, comparatively speaking, the small debt of \$50,000.00.

During its thirty-three years' existence, Holy Family Parish has steadily progressed despite the hindering geographical and topographical conditions of the western hill, until it has assumed the enviable proportions of a parish numbering among its members some nine hundred families. Price Hill, with its vast and ever-increasing Catholic population, may well be proud of its Mother Catholic Church, St. Lawrence, the first offspring Holy Family, and the rapidly growing "Little Brother," St. William, not "Overlooking" the expected arrival, let us say, of the new "St. Benedict" Church.

On this date, the 18th of June, 1916, Holy Family Parish does honor to all and is honored by all, doing all for the greater honor and glory of God and the good of the Catholic religion, which is a sustaining factor in the good citizenship of a grand and

glorious Republic.

May the future history of Holy Family Parish be as glorious as its past!

The Dedication or Blessing of a New Church

HE Bishop and his ministers proceed from the sacristy to the front door of the church, and there recite a short prayer. The Bishop then intones the "Asperges" and the choir sings the Psalm "Miserere." During the singing of this Psalm the Bishop blesses with holy water the exterior walls of the church. Returning to the front door he prays that God may deign to cleanse and purify this holy place from all stain. The procession then enters the church and the Litany of all Saints is sung. At the invocation, "Ut Omnibus Fidelibus," the Bishop rises and calls upon God to bless this church. After the Litany the Antiphon, "Benedic Domine," is intoned by the Bishop and the choir sings three Psalms. In the meantime the Bishop blesses with holy water the interior walls of the church. Returning to the altar he prays that God may pour forth His blessing upon this house, so that all who therein call upon His holy name may obtain mercy through Christ Our Lord.

CONSECRATION OF THE ALTAR

After a short prayer the Bishop and his ministers kneel before the altar to be consecrated, and the Litany of All Saints is chanted. At the "Ut Omnibus Fidelibus," the Bishop rises, and taking the crozier in his left hand and raising his right hand in benediction, calls upon God three times that He may deign to bless, sanctify and consecrate this altar. The Litany being finished, the Bishop goes to the Epistle side of the altar and raising his voice a tone higher each time, asks Almighty God to assist him in the work he is about to perform. The "Gregorian Water" (so-called after St. Gregory the Great) is then blessed. This water contains ashes, salt and wine and was prescribed by St. Gregory for the consecration of an altar. Having first blessed the three above named articles, the Bishop takes a handful of salt and sprinkles it upon the ashes three times in the form of a cross. He then takes a handful of this mixt. and drops it into the water three times in the form of a cross. The blessed wine is then poured into the water.

THE SPRINKLING OF THE ALTAR

The Bishop and his ministers now proceed to the foot of the altar. Ascending the steps the Bishop intones the Antiphon, "Introibo ad altare Dei," (I shall ascend to the altar of God). He then dips his thumb into the blessed water and makes with it the sign of the cross on the table of the altar. Praying that this altar may be sanctified for the greater honor of God and of the Blessed Mary ever Virgin and of all the Saints, he makes the sign of the cross three times over the place which he signed with the blessed water. This same ceremony is repeated successively at the four corners of the altar. After a short prayer, the Bishop sprinkles the support and the table of the altar conjointly, beginning at the middle and then going to the Epistle side and then to the Gospel side. This he does seven times, three verses of the "Miserere" being sung during each sprinkling. After the last verse of the "Miserere" has been sung, the Bishop says a short prayer. He then blesses the cement which is used later for fastening the slab of stone over the Holy Relics.

The Holy Relics are now brought to the altar in solemn procession.

PLACING OF THE HOLY RELICS IN THE SEPULCHRE

Having placed the Holy Relics on a table, the Bishop returns to the foot of the altar. Ascending to the altar he prays that this consecrated place may remain inviolable and that the faithful may obtain the benefits of God's gifts through Christ Our Lord. He then anoints the inside of the sepulchre with Holy Chrism, praying that this sepulchre which is to contain the Holy Relics of Saints may be consecrated and sanctified. The Holy Relics are then reverently brought to the altar by the Bishop, who places them in the sepulchre and incenses them. He then anoints, with Holy Chrism, the small slab that is to cover the sepulchre, and with blessed cement fastens it over the opening in the sepulchre and again with Holy Chrism anoints the upper side of the slab and the altar.

INCENSATION OF THE ALTAR

The Bishop now incenses the altar; after which two priests cleanse the altar and its base. The Bishop then incenses the table of the altar, first at the center and then at the four corners, finally passing around it three times incensing the support and the conjointly. After the third incensation the "incensing priest" receives the censer and incenses the altar continuously exception is hop uses the censer during the course of the consecration.

ANOINTING THE ALTAR.


The Bishop now anoints the altar with the Oil of Catechumens, first at the center then at the four corners. After incensation and a short prayer, he again anoints the altar, this time with Holy Chrism. Then taking the vessels containing the Holy Chrism and the Oil of Catechumens he pours the Holy Oils conjointly upon the table of the altar and with the palm of his hand spreads them over the entire surface. Standing at the altar he prays that this altar, upon which he has poured the sacred unctions, may be blessed and consecrated to receive the prayers and sacrifices of the people, and that Almighty God may deign to hear the supplications which ascend to Him.

BURNING OF INCENSE ON THE ALTAR

The Bishop blesses and sprinkles with Holy Water the grains of incense. Then with five grains of incense, he forms a cross at each of the five places on the table of the altar where he had made the unctions with the Oil of Catechumens and Holy Chrism, and upon each of these crosses he places a cross made of wax tapers. As soon as the Bishop has completed the fifth cross, the four ends of each cross are lighted, during which time he kneels upon the lowest step of the altar and intones the "Veni Sancte Spiritus." When the grains of incense are consumed the altar is scraped and cleaned. The Bishop then prays that God may graciously hear the prayers of His people and receive with favor the sacrifices which will be offered upon this altar. Having finished this prayer, the Bishop sings a long preface.

ANOINTING OF THE FRONT, JUNCTURE AND SUPPORT OF THE ALTAR


During the singing of a psalm the Bishop anoints the front of the altar with Holy Chrism. After a short prayer at the foot of the altar he goes to the posterior corner at the Gospel side, and with Holy Chrism makes a triple sign of the cross over the juncture of the table and the support as if to join them together. This ceremony is repeated at the other three corners of the altar. He then asks C to bless this altar with heavenly blessing and that, as He once received the oblation of His high priest Melchisedech, He may deing the eceive the sacrifices offered on this new altar, and that through them the faithful who gather in this holy house may obtain the sacration of their souls. The Bishop then goes to the throne and washes his hands. In the meantime the altar is prepared for Mass, which celebrated in the usual manner.





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

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Holy Family Gymnasium Association

Brief History and Purpose, Facilities and Activities

The completion in 1910 of the new Holy Family School Building lent inspiration to a desire to make the course as thorough and complete as possible.

The need of health and physical fitness to attain success in life is now almost universally realized. Education that does not recognize the proper relation of the physical to moral and mental development is regarded as seriously deficient.

In the light of these convictions a movement was started to add physical education to the school curriculum, so that our children would be aided to grow into sturdy, as well as God-fearing, manhood and womanhood, well fitted to fight the grim battle of life and safely arrive at the goal of eternal reward.

Accompanying this movement was a widespread sentiment to enlarge its scope and extend its benefits to the entire parish; especially to try to safeguard the morals and ideals of the young, so carefully instilled in our parochial schools, by supplying needed wholesome recreation, social intercourse and physical activities under Catholic auspices.

Out of the many enthusiastic meetings held in the winter of 1910-11 evolved the Holy Family Gymnasium Association. Solicitations in the parish met a hearty and enthusiastic response and a handsome fund was contributed for equipment.

It was decided to start a parish recreation and social center attractive to every age, sex and taste. A constitution was drawn, officers elected and the institution was thrown open on September 1, 1911, with a rush of members joining. It has since always enjoyed the favor of the parish. The present season of 1915-16 being the banner year, having enjoyed a 40 per cent. increase in membership. Materialization of present plans will make the coming season an epochal one in the history of the Holy Family Gymnasium Association.

The following illustrations will give an idea of some of the activities and facilities:




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
Herewith is presented the host that inspired the organization of the Holy Family Gymnasium Association, and gives an idea of the extent of this feature maintained by the Gym.

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
MEN'S GYM CLASS.


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
BASKET BALL.
